ABOUT CCFU

Community Care Foundation-Uganda (CCFU). CCFU is a youth led non-profit community based organization founded by a group of young peoples who volunteered their time to work towards social transformation. It is working to improve the wellbeing of vulnerable young people, women & elderly in Masaka region to live a better & a purpose driven life through Educating, Engaging & Empowering them.

MISSION: To promote the well-being of young people to live a better and a purpose driven life through educating, engaging & empowering them.

VISION: To have communities where the young people can have opportunities to maximize their potential and influence decisions that affect their lives.

OUR ACTIVITIES

Project Highlight 1 - Education.

As CCFU is a youth oriented organization, we work towards educating, engaging and empowering young people to achieve their dreams as they grow.



We were able to support the education of 40 children from the 30 that were supported in 2017, paying their school fees and scholastic materials. We have 15 children in primary school (all of them at Kasana Junior Primary school Nyendo) and we also have 25 children in secondary school and they are at different schools like Nyendo Mixed, New Horizon High School, Centenary High, St Anthony Kayunga S.S and Kijabwemi S.S. We have both boys and girls but the big percentage are girls. We tracked and assessed the progress of our students on a monthly basis so that we help them have a good performance. We had 3 (three) candidates in primary seven who passed well in their Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE) with 1st and 2nd grades and they are to join secondary school next year 2019 and we also had 4 (four) candidates in Senior Four (S.4).

The support for this program is from our friends and partners in South Korea, Spain, Canada & USA.



Menstrual Hygiene Management

This project grown stronger than how it was last year because we extended from Masaka to the near districts of Kyotera and Kalungu. Our social workers provided the girls with accurate information about their menstrual periods and how best to handle it. We were also able to give out sanitary pad kits to 602 girls in 6 schools (4 schools in Masaka, 1 school in Kyotera and 1 school in Kalungu district. The schools that benefited in this program in 2018 are Nkuke Primary School, St Modesta Bisanje Primary School, Green Valley Kasanje Primary School, Kyesiiga Primary School, St Bruno Ndegeya Primary School and Bisanje Primary School. Peer Led Education.

We were able to provide peer led sessions to young people in and out of schools. The young people were divided into three groups; ie 12-16 years, 17-19 years and 20-24 years.

The following aspects were handled; Sexual Reproductive Health & Rights (SRHR), Career guidance & counseling sessions and Behavior changes. We did believe and still believe that if these young people have access to correct and accurate information on their reproductive health it can help them have better informed health choices, over 1100 students in different schools were involved in this programs and over 250 young people out of school were involved in this making a total of 1358 young people, in this situation we visited schools and interacted with the students as we gave them knowledge and also answering their questions. We also mobilized youth out of school and we did the same. All these activities were done by our social workers with assistance of volunteers and peer educators.

Women Empowerment



We were able to put in place 2 women saving groups among the parents of the children we help with education and other community members to help them with good financial skills, help them to adopt the saving culture so that they can save some little money which was distributed among themselves after a certain period of time and used it to start something to sustain themselves. But in the process of saving before distributed it, they used it to provide loans to those in them who needed it at a very low interest rate.

In addition to support these women we provided small loans to 5 women at (0) interest which enabled them start something or to help those who already had small business but in a poor conditions to boost it, each one got 125,000/=. They will return or pay back this money after given period of time and it will also be given to others.

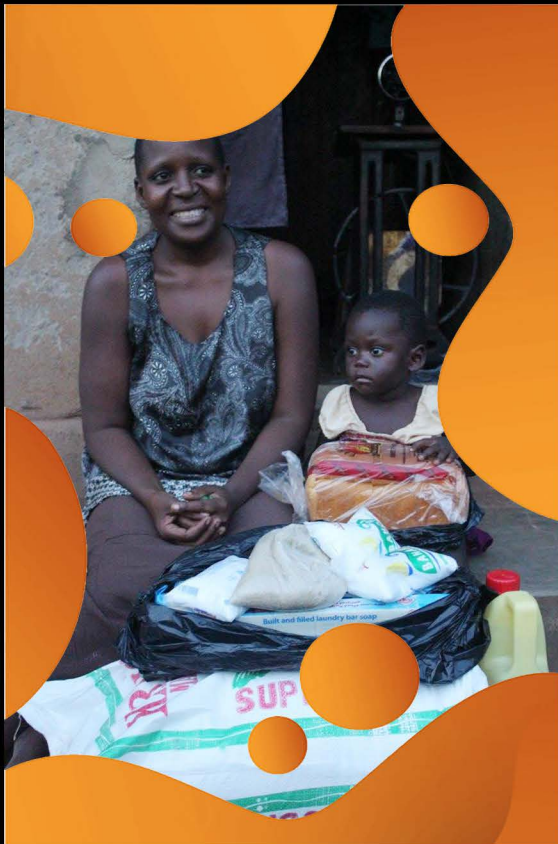
Basic Need Support.

In our basic need support we were able to provide different basic needs to different communities.

We have provided things like maize flour, soap, salt and sugar to different 15 families and individuals who find this difficult to access these items, most of the people who get these things are the elderly (each beneficially get 25kgs of maize flour, 2bars of soap, and 5kgs of sugar and 1Kg of salt plus a packate of matchboxes)

Street Kids

We on some occasions provided a meal/a cup of porridge a day to some of the street kids living on the streets of Nyendo atleast to improve on their nutrition, we know it is really hard to sleep outside in that condition of coldness with empty stomach that's why we decided to do this showing these little one that atleast some care about them. We did this as we counsel these boys to get back home to their parents or relatives and live a normal life. We were able to reunite 3 kids together with their relatives and accepted to get back to school.



Our Partnerships

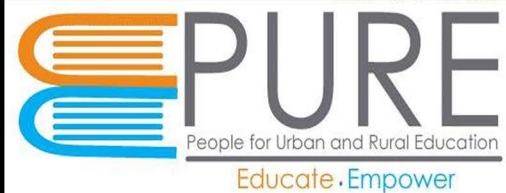
What make our activities successful is our co-operation with our partners.

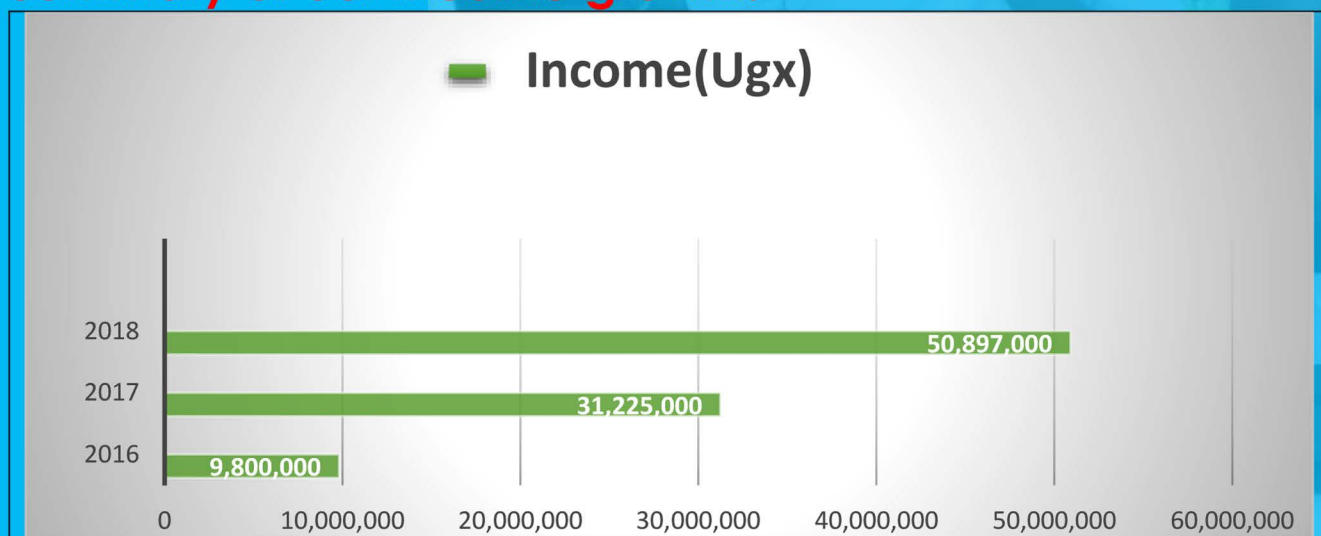


Financial Overview

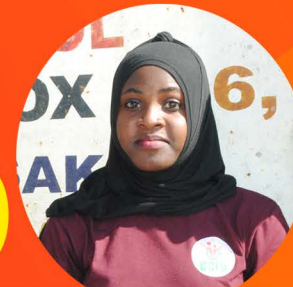

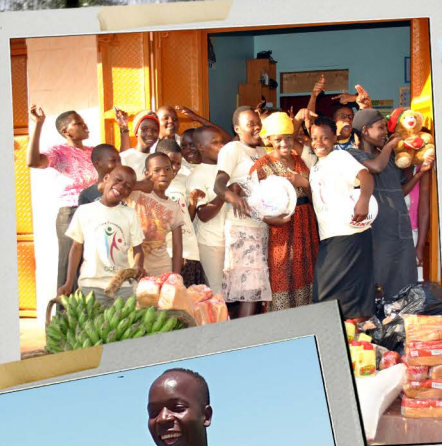
